The School Bus Continues to be a Blessing

The new school bus makes three trips daily around the communities surrounding the Amazing Grace School, transporting around 200 children and a few teachers to and from the school everyday. The children's families pay a small fee to help with petrol costs (around 10 cents each day), which amounts to less than half of what they

would pay using public transportation.

The school bus also provides safe transport for children too young to take public transportation alone. The nursery and kindergarten classes of the school have grown as a result (we now have over 200 children at the nursery and kindergarten ages alone).

With the new bus the school is free to take field trips. This year, the eighth grade class toured a dam about 60 miles from the school which provides much of the power and clean water for the city of Kumasi. In science they were learning about water purification and distribution and the field trip supplemented the classroom. The third and fourth grade classes each were

able to visit a cultural museum in downtown Kumasi, learning more about the history and culture of their nation. The seventh graders also visited the Kumasi Zoo to reinforce their unit on the ecosystem (animals, their habitats, food chains, etc.). These trips would not have been possible without the bus. The vehicle has blessed the school this year, and will do so for years to come.

This bus came to the school as a result of some substantial donations from some faithful supporters. It was also purchased with money raised by two college students who lived in a car for a week as part of a contest, won a car, and then sold that car to raise money for the Amazing Grace School. - Jared Warner and Tom Stricklin
